



The last survivor of the Perry ex-pedition to Japan, in 1854 was buried at Lexington, Neb., Tuesday. This was Robert L. May, aged 85, formerly an Omaha man. He died at Denver last Sunday. For years Mr. May has been spok-en of as the sole survivor of the fa-mous expedition made by Commo-dore Perry in 1854, when he sailed into the ports of Japan and opened the Flowery Kingdom to the com-merce of the world. Mr. May was a navigator, a second licutenant on the ship Susquehanna. Latter during the civil war he was captain of one of the ships under Farragut in the celebrated battle of Mobile bay. Years aiterward he lived in Omaha


