Receipts—Packer market opened dull and fully a dime lower. Packers made opening offers as much as 10c lower, and reports coming from the markets and shippers buying sparingly the outlook was not very bright, quite a few hogs selling on the round.

As the morning advanced, however, the trade improved steadily, and later in the day a good market was evidenced. Some packers took any more than 10c lower, while others claimed they bought hogs on the close that were 10c higher than the market and bulk of the supply was cleaned up early.

Values were generally 10c to 15c lower than yesterday's average. Most of the sales landed at \$9.50 to \$10.00 and while this is low in more than one respect, it is a price over \$10.00 for some choice light, pricier over a big one and in some cases a quarter lower than the close of last week.

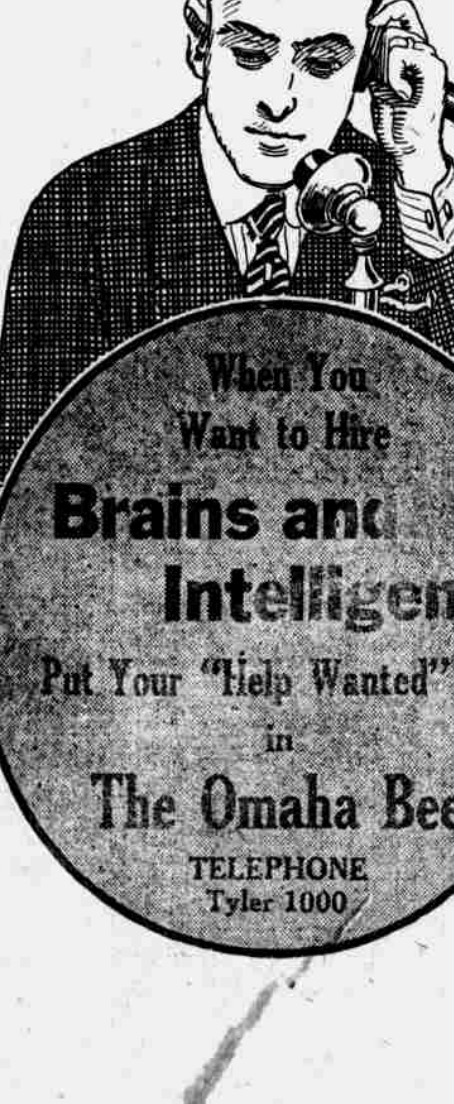
