The Britannic, built for the Liverpool-New York trade, was never in the service. It was about ready to be turned over for its initial voyage when the war began and it was commandeered and fitted up for hospital purposes.

Burlington Would Enjoin Any Strike

Council Bluffs, Ia., Nov. 22.—The Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad company filed in the United States district court here late yesterday a suit asking that the Adamson law be declared unconstitutional and further asking injunctions against the United States government to prevent enforcement of the law and against the members of four railway brotherhoods against inaugurating strikes if the provisions of the law are disregarded by the company.

MRS. DODGE DIES OF HEART FAILURE

Widow of Pioneer Council Bluffs Business Man Dies at Age of 78 Years.

condolence on the death of Emperor Francis Joseph of Austria-Hungary were prepared at the State department today in expectation of immediate official announcement from the Austrian charge here.

Congratulations to the new monarch will not be sent until later, when his ascension to the throne is officially reported.

The German embassy, basing its views upon an intimate knowledge of conditions in the imperial monarchy, is certain the death of Emperor Francis Joseph and the ascension of Charles Francis Joseph will result in renewed military activity of a most energetic character.

The dead monarch by reason of his age and his infirmities has taken no more than a passively active part in the war plans for some months. The new ruler has been actively engaged on various fronts where the Austro-Hungarian armies have been operating during the last two years.

Count von Bernstorff, the German ambassador, feels that from an internal political viewpoint, the death of the Austrian emperor will not have the slightest effect on the war. In times of peace such an event might have a strong effect. In war time, however, the ambassador believes the people are united for success of their arms.

Move to Unite Suits

Washington, D. C., Nov. 22.—An agreement between the railroads and the Department of Justice to ask the supreme court to pass on the constitutionality of the Adamson act before January 1, when it takes effect, appeared to be near at hand today.

Counsel for the Pennsylvania, New York Central and Burlington roads are conferring on the subject and it is said they may seek to have the suit of the Atchafalaya, Topeka & Santa Fe, set for hearing at Kansas City tomorrow, made a test case.

Final decision in the matter, however, probably will await word from G. C. Todd and Marvin E. Underwood of the Department of Justice, who will appear in the Santa Fe case.

Government officials were greatly interested in Judge Hook's decision holding the Adamson act unconstitutional.

At a conference held today between Attorney General Gregory and railroad attorneys tentative plans were made to center the contest over constitutionality of the Adamson law in one test case and expedite an early hearing in the supreme court.

If perfected, the agreement would provide that the railroads would drop other suits if the law were held constitutional and would bring no further suits while the case is pending. Both sides would work to get a final decision before January 1, when the law becomes effective.
