

TRAFFIC BUREAU IS SEEKING HELP

Says There Are Hundred Jobbers and Manufacturers Who Should Aid in Work.

BUT FEW AS SUBSCRIBERS

About 100 jobbers and manufacturers in Omaha are "pikers" in the opinion of the governing committee of the traffic bureau of the Commercial club. That is, they are "pikers" in that they haven't come into the circle and helped stand the expense of making the fight for the last two years for proper freight rates in Nebraska. No, the bureau does not use the word "pikers" in addressing these 100 jobbers and manufacturers, but it will nevertheless write them a letter. It wants to see them come in and throw their bit in the general pot to keep up the fight. Clarke Coit, chairman of the governing committee of the traffic bureau, and E. J. McVann, manager of the bureau, are to address a letter to these jobbers and point out to them that certain jobbers and manufacturers in Omaha have been standing all the expense of making a big fight that is to be of benefit to all.

Less Than Half Subscribe. About fifty jobbers and manufacturers of Omaha are subscribers to the bureau and are thus standing the whole expense of making this fight. There are at least 150 jobbers and manufacturers in Omaha shipping under class rates that should take part in this fight, according to members of the governing committee. The committee believes it is time for a general awakening.

The Nebraska rate situation is still in a tangle and the bureau wishes to hurry the untangling. The disposition of the railroads, as the bureau sees it, is to seek a readjustment of the rates as between competing cities and the territory they seek to cover, so as to put it back to somewhere near where it used to be, since the Interstate Commerce commission has thrown out the Nebraska rates of general order No. 19. The bureau feels the necessity of having this readjustment made as soon as possible, and wishes to go to work and help in this readjustment.

The other alumnae team will consist of those who were graduated during the period of Brownell's history up to the beginning of the present century. This takes in the administrations of Dr. Robert Doherty, C. C. Hall and those who preceded them in the office of principal. Mrs. Philip Potter, Mrs. T. L. Ring, Mrs. George Cassels Smith, Mrs. J. Barkalow and others will be members of this team.

Raise of Hope Fund Nears Ten Thousand First Day and Half

For the first day and a half of the House of Hope building fund campaign the teams have raised a total of \$9,506.50.

At a meeting of the team captains at luncheon at Hotel Fontenelle Mrs. Eleanor Nelson's team was awarded first place for reporting the largest amount for the second day, this team's efforts yielding \$908.25.

The total of the second day's work was \$1,844.30, of which \$1,041.30 was collected by the women's teams. The men said they realized they will have to put on high speed or be outdistanced by their feminine co-workers.

Twice as Many For Poultry Show As For Last Year

The Omaha poultry show, to be held in the Omaha Auditorium for five days, beginning next Tuesday, promises to break all records for number of entries in any former Omaha show. In fact, it will likely be larger than any poultry show west of Chicago this season.

Already twice as many entries have been received as at last year's and additional entries are coming in every mail.

Russell Palmer, manager of the 1733 Ranch, Kearney, Neb., talked to the local association yesterday over the long-distance phone and advises he is sending 136 birds. So far, this will be the largest single entry for this year.

Entries have been received from twelve states—Nebraska, Iowa, Missouri, South Dakota, Kansas, Colorado, Minnesota, Indiana, Ohio, Michigan and Massachusetts.

Entire carloads of birds are coming from Fremont, Red Oak, Ia.; Kearney, Falls City and other places.

Up to Thursday noon 297 Rhode Island Reds have been entered. This is the largest class so far.

F. L. Sewell, the renowned poultry artist of Niles, Mich., wires that he will be in Omaha Monday morning and be at the show for at least three days before leaving for the big New York City poultry show. Visitors will have an opportunity to see Artist Sewell at work sketching the prize winning birds.

The birds will reach Omaha on Saturday and Sunday. A few will begin to arrive on Friday. The judging will begin early Monday morning and the ribbons will all be in place by Tuesday morning when the show is thrown open to the public.

Four of the best poultry judges in the country will do the judging. These are F. H. Shellabarger, West Liberty, Ia.; A. B. Shamer, Lenox, Ill.; Guy Schreff, Lincoln, and Earl Smiley, Beaver Crossing, Neb.
