GRAIN AND PRODUCE

Cash Wheat Market Very Dull, Owing to Lack of Shipping Facilities.

Omaha, December 8, 1916. The cash market was extremely dull today, and while the demand was moderately active, the buyers were prevented from taking any amount of grain on account of their inability to ship from this market due to the shortage in boats.

It was almost impossible to give a correct statement of prices as compared with yesterday, but the few sales that were reported were made at a considerable decline.

The corn market was also very quiet and the market ruled from unchanged to 1c lower, with the bulk of the offerings going at 48c and 49c.

The demand for corn was fairly active at the prevailing prices, but sellers generally were not anxious to let go and held over a large percentage of the samples.

The oats market was quoted from 1/2c to 1c lower and the bulk of the offerings going at 22c and 23c.

The demand for oats was fairly active at the prevailing prices, but sellers generally were not anxious to let go and held over a large percentage of the samples.

The rye market was quoted from 1/2c to 1c lower and the bulk of the offerings going at 18c and 19c.

Selling Because of Disquieting News Causes Drop in Wheat.

Chicago, Dec. 8.—Increased activity of German submarines and a rapidly growing list of differences between Washington and Berlin as to the status of some of the vessels which have been sunk did a good deal to force wheat prices down today.

The market closed nervous, 1/2c to 1c net lower, with May at \$1.74, July at \$1.74, and September at \$1.74.
