**MEN MAKE GOOD RECORD**

The fund for the rebuilding of Brownell Hall has reached \$92,160. The canvassing teams reported a total of \$5,026 at the luncheon at the Hotel Fontenelle at noon, and some of the teams reported good prospects.

Ward Burgess was the biggest personal subscriber of the day, having come through with another \$1,000 after he had already subscribed \$2,000 previously.

Mrs. Lyela Turner of New York subscribed \$300 and J. T. Stewart, 2d, subscribed \$250.

Captain Joseph Dodds of Team No. 8 gave a " pep " talk to the committee. He spoke of the charity that buys food and raiment for the poor as temporary, and "reconstructive rather than constructive." He declared, "We must take care of some constructive work absolutely necessary to the progress of the race." He spoke of the construction of Brownell Hall as a type of such work which will have a lasting influence in the community and in the world.

**Evangelism Urged On Presbyterians**

Evangelistic meetings are urged upon Presbyterians of the state by the committee with this matter in charge, which met yesterday at the Loyal hotel for a conference following appointment at the meeting of the synod. Pastors were urged to hold meetings during January and February of 1917, and wherever better results might follow, and it is impossible to secure services of a special evangelist the interchange of pulpits was advised. The committee will in a short time send detailed instructions to the ministers. The state evangelist of the Presbyterian church is now holding meetings at Osmond and during February has engagements at Fremont, Cedar Bluffs and Valentine. Last year he was employed steadily for thirty-nine weeks in this work.

**Believing Husband Dead, Wife Sues**

Presuming that her husband, Charles Delmar Mitchell, is dead, Mrs. Alice E. E. Mitchell has filed a suit for \$3,500 against the American Bridge company. She alleges that Mr. Mitchell, who was a watchman at the Union Pacific's new bridge and which is being built by the defendant company, met his death while on duty, through the fault of the company.

As yet there is no legal proof that the complainant's husband is dead. He is recorded on the police blotter as "missing" ever since the morning of October 30, when his cap was found on the bridge. The river's bed has been dynamited, but his body has not been found. It has been suggested that Mr. Mitchell was the victim of amnesia and wandered off, made suddenly forgetful by a mental lapse, of his wife and home.

Lawyers say the suit filed by Mrs. Mitchell is one of the most unique recorded in the district court.
