There was a delay of thirty minutes in order to make some changes in the rollers under the spans and again a start was made, this time the bridge a start was made, this time the bridge rolled along until its north side was well over the piers. Again it was found necessary to make some changes in the pulling machinery, in-bricate the tracks on which the rollers turned and tightened up some of the guide ropes. This having been done, again the signal to-move was given and the great mass of steel rolled along, apparently with as little effort as would be required to push a baby cab. This time, before the engines stopped working, the bridge was in place, the joints and bolt holes in the plates at the ends fitting those of that portion of the old structure to which it is attached.

Great lifting cranes were brought up to either end of the new bridge and with these, rails that had been taken from the tracks on the approches were laid in place. Power jacks were applied at the piers and the entire new bridge lifted enough so that the rolls used in its moving could be released. Then it was slowly dropped onto the tops of the piers, the steel girders imbedding their hottoms in thick sheet lead, placed there so that the weight of the bridge will sink all of the rough edges of the face of the steel into it and at the same time, drive the lead down into the crevices and holes in the rock, thus preventing any slipping of girders of the main superstructure.

This work required some time, but with the gang of expert workmen, each knowing the particular duty he was to perform, the bridge was lined up and ready for the passing of the evening trains, at 4:20 o clock.

Crowd Watches Work.

Propably 1,000 persons stood in the cold and watched rhe moving of the two bridges, but only those having passes were permitted on the approaches, the others having to content themselves by standing back in the railroad yards; 1,000 to 1,200 feet away.

Hodson, road foreman of the Nebraska division and fired by Ottos Beckel. Riding on it were J. L. Allidat, general road foreman, and C. F. Jones, an engineer.


