Jewish Philosophy
Subject of Lecture

Dr. Schmarja Levin, former member of the Russian Duma, and Zionist leader, addressed a large audience at the Russian synagogue last evening on the "Philosophy of Judaism." Jewish philosophy, he said, was based on human nature. It was collective instead of being individual and its foundation was laid on the old saying of "love thy neighbor as thyself."

He drew a parallel between cosmopolitanism and internationalism. The former was the ideal of a country, he said, but the latter was the ideal of the world.

"What is it that has kept the Jewish people together for 2,000 years?" he asked. "It is not because they are physically strong. It is not because they are afforded protection. The only thing that has kept them together is their philosophy, their religion and their belief in the Old Testament."

Compulsory Health Insurance Is Urged By Yale Professor

Columbus, O., Dec. 28.—Presidents of four national organizations, the American Economic association, the American Sociological society, the American Statistical Association and the American Association for Labor Legislation, delivered addresses at a joint meeting of three organizations here tonight. It was the opening of a four days' convention and was presided over by Dr. W. O. Thompson, president of Ohio State university.

Prof. Irving Fisher of Yale university, president of the American Association for Labor Legislation, in his address tonight spoke in favor of the nation-wide campaign now under way for compulsory health insurance.

George E. Vincent of Minnesota, president of the American Sociological Society, discussing "countrywide and nation," declared that as an industry farming pays the average farmer less than day wages; that only increases in land values gives him a deplorable sense of prospering from agriculture; that tenancy is increasing disconcertingly even in the best farming regions such Iowa and Illinois; that the rural population is increasingly

foot loose and migratory and that by reason of these conditions education, social life, political responsibility, moral standards and religious functions are being neglected alarmingly and undermined.

The attending physician has hopes for his recovery.
