Mrs. Leroy attempted to replenish a fire from coal oil December 31 and the can exploded. Her clothes and those of her baby were sprayed with flaming oil and caught fire. Both the mother and baby were severely burned before Mr. Leroy could ex-

On New Year's day Mrs. Leroy and Robert were taken to St. Joseph's hospital, and at first it was believed that they would recover. Mrs. Leroy's condition grew worse, however, and she died a week ago. Then the baby suffered a rapid decline until his death.
