BETHLEHEM STEEL GAINS

New York, Feb. 3.—The stock market's reaction to the news of relations with Germany was a sudden uprush of prices, many shares recovering from early declines of 2 to 3 points.

More than 500,000 shares of Steel common changed hands today, the extremely active last thirty minutes, its maximum of the day was 19 1/2 and its final figure, 18 1/2.
