Nebraska "JUNKET" CALL LIKE RED RAG TO MEMBERS

House Kills Bill Providing for Permanent Forestation Commission.

HOG BARN BILL IS PASSED

(From a Staff Correspondent.) Lincoln, Feb. 7.—(Special.)—Some of the members who opposed an appropriation of \$80,000 for a hog barn had evidently heard from home when the bill came up for final passage this morning and the measure went through by practically a two-to-one vote, whereas last week it had barely squeezed through in committee of the whole. The vote stood 63 to 33. Because the records in the office of the state auditor showed that Woodruff Ball, a member of the forestation committee, had spent \$177 in a trip to Washington to confer with government officials having in charge the development of the arid lands of the country into forests, Chairman Reischick of the finance ways and means committee of the house pronounced the trip a "junket trip" and the members fell over themselves in their efforts to kill the bill providing for a permanent forestation commission. Although given an appropriation of \$2,000 at the last session for the purpose of investigating and looking into the matter of developing the sand hills of the state, the committee had been so careful that less than one-half of it had been used. The commission serves without pay and only receives its actual expenses, yet when a member spends a small part of the appropriation doing what he is expected to do the members will yell "junket trip." Fifty voted against the bill and thirty-nine for it.

Burlington Bridge Over Platte Is Partly Destroyed by Fire

Columbus, Neb., Feb. 7.—(Special Telegram.)—Four spans of the Burlington railroad bridge over the Platte river, five miles southeast of Columbus, were totally destroyed by fire last night. Agent Rector sent out a special train from here to meet the evening passenger train from Lincoln. Passengers disembarked and walking across the ice. Reconstruction has already begun and it is expected trains will be able to pass by tomorrow. Sparks from an engine caused the fire. Damage is estimated at about \$2,000.

Big Floods Expected Along the Platte River

Fremont, Neb., Feb. 7.—(Special.)—Railroad men who have been keeping watch on the antics of the Platte river are looking for a big flood when the ice goes out this spring. The ice on the river is over a foot thick and if the cold weather continues a few inches will be added. The dyke erected along the bank of the river west of Fremont four years ago at a cost of thousands of dollars will be given its test this year, railroad men believe, as the ice is thicker than for years.

Southwestern Poultry Show Being Held at Holdrege

Holdrege, Neb., Feb. 7.—(Special.)—Six hundred and eight birds are being shown at the third annual poultry show of the southwestern Nebraska district. This is an increase of 40 per cent over last year's entries. Practically every standard breed is represented with the Buff Orpingtons and Barred Rocks leading other breeds in numbers.

Man Drawn Into Fly Wheel

Tecumseh, Neb., Feb. 7.—(Special.)—Edward Weers, son of Mrs. Anna Weers of Johnson, is suffering the effects of a serious accident. He was assisting with corn shelling on a farm near that place and was working near the engine. His clothing became entangled in the fly wheel of the machine and before the engine could be stopped Mr. Weers was drawn into it. His right leg was broken in two places above the knee.

Notes from Syracuse

Syracuse, Neb., Feb. 7.—(Special.)—The twelfth annual session of the Syracuse Farmers' institute closed here last evening after a profitable session. The exhibits, while not large, were of splendid quality, and the school exhibit won particular praise. The speakers were J. F. Coupe of Omaha, on Monday, and Prof. Spafford and Miss Louise Meredith of the university college of Nebraska, on Tuesday. Officers were elected as follows: President, C. L. France; vice president, F. W. Brehm; secretary, L. B. Smoyer; treasurer, Warren Andrews. Directors: Edwin P. Andrews, T. W. Copenhaver, Clarence Beers, L. C. Miesbach and Lewis Wiles. The ladies' auxiliary elected Mrs. Bessie Wiles president and Mrs. Agnes Keithley secretary. The seventy-five horsepower Diesel engine and the electric light plant is here and is being installed and the indications are that in ten days there will be light current on the wires. Henry F. Windels, who died suddenly from pneumonia at his home in this place, was buried today at Park Hill cemetery.

"Let's get down to business, gentlemen, and cut out this damn foolishness," said the representative from Boone, following a speech by Howard in which he desired to prohibit the printing of "The Star Spangled Banner" unless the whole thing was printed. Auten suggested that if any gentleman of his house desired to perform for the benefit of the galleries he had better get a job in some vaudeville theater and let the house transact business if it wanted to. Peterson seconded the suggestion and the house promptly indefinitely postponed the bill.

Notes from Beatrice And Gage County

Beatrice, Neb., Feb. 7.—(Special.)—The directors of the Beatrice Commercial club last evening elected these officers: President, W. H. De Bolt; vice president, Mercer B. Walker; treasurer, J. R. Queen. The election of secretary was postponed. Endorsement was given a bill for the employment of convict labor on roads now before the legislature. Mrs. A. H. Hollingsworth, wife of Lieutenant Colonel Hollingsworth of Company C, returned yesterday from the border, where she has been for the last few months. Charles Bowdish of Lincoln, who was arrested here a few weeks ago in company with Miss Ethel Lewis on a charge of disorderly conduct, was released yesterday after his hearing before Judge Ellis. Miss Lewis was paroled to the probation officer. Bowdish is a married man. Mrs. William Lagorgue of Hardy, Neb., formerly a resident of Wymore and Odell, died suddenly on a Burlington train as it neared Hardy Monday afternoon. She is survived by Mr. Lagorgue and three children. The body will be interred at Odell.

Body of Connett is Taken To Auburn for Burial

North Platte, Neb., Feb. 7.—(Special.)—Nearly two years after the murder of Vernon Connett his body is on the way to its final resting place. After the sentencing of Roy Roberts to twenty-five years in the state penitentiary following his confession, through his plea of guilty to the slaying of Connett, the skull that had been held as the chief exhibit of the state was released by the sheriff and the body was taken from the morgue, where it had been held since it was taken from the South Platte river February 15, 1915, and was sent to Auburn, Neb., for burial. Andrew J. Connett, father of the murdered man, and a brother took charge of the body and placed it on an evening train that bore it eastward toward its last resting place.

NO SUNDAY BARBER WORK UNDER BILL

House Favors Measure to Cut It Out Over the Entire State.

DECIDED OPINIONS HELD

(From a Staff Correspondent.) Lincoln, Feb. 7.—(Special.)—The bill to prohibit Sunday barber work in Omaha, changed in form to cover all cities and towns of Nebraska, was put through the whole committee of the house this afternoon and advanced to third reading, after a motion to kill it was voted down. Farmer members began to knock the bill after an amendment proposed by Mr. Nesbit had been adopted, making it apply to all towns in the state. Mr. Andersen of Boyd moved to indefinitely postpone it. The motion was supported by Mr. Bates. The other side of the question was taken by Mr. Schwab, who roasted the ruralists to brown turn. He said the small town barbers, as a rule, do not want to keep open on Sunday, but the farmers demand it, when the latter could just as well get shaved some other day. Mr. Fuhs claimed that the present law prohibiting common labor on Sunday applies to barbers and a new act is therefore unnecessary. The ten commandments were rung into the discussion by Messrs. Reischer, Olsen and Jacobson, who were strong for the bill. "I move to amend by prohibiting the repairing of automobiles and the sale of gasoline," interrupted aBtes. "Gentlemen, you have got to settle this yourselves," "I'll take no part," remarked heavily-bearded Hoffmeister, as the house yelled with laughter.

House Vote Favors LIMITED SUFFRAGE

Norton Bill Permitting Women to Ballot for President and City Officers Passed. (From a Staff Correspondent.) Lincoln, Feb. 7.—(Special Telegram.)—By a vote of 73 to 24, the house this morning voted in favor of allowing women to vote for president and vice president, and in all city elections. Richmond, Schneider and Jelen of the Douglas county delegation voted against the bill. The bill today will go to the senate, where it will face Senator Robertson's proposed amendment to leave the question whether the women should vote to the women themselves. The amendment looks very attractive to many of the senators and it is likely to bring out a deal of oratory which may jeopardize its passage through the upper body. That the suffragists do not like the amendment is evidenced by the announcement of the president of the suffrage association of the state that the senator's amendment was "the most assinine thing yet proposed." However, the Holt county statesman is standing up under the accusation and has no intention of pulling his amendment back even in the face of such a condemnation. How Vote Stood. Those voting against the bill were: Anderson (Boyd), Behrens, Conley, Dau, Flansburg, Foulson, Fuller, Gentry, Hutton, Jelen, Eric Johnson, Knutson, Kueh, Lougish, Meyersburg, Neff, Osterman, Pollock, Richmond, Saas, Schneider, Segel, Walter and Ward. Three members—Harris (Buffalo), Regan and Trimble—were absent. All others voted for the bill. A good many explanations were offered by members in casting their

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

votes. Andersen (Boyd) was opposed because it would "double the expense of election and practically make no difference in the results." Conley was afraid the passage of such a law would impede the movement for full suffrage, which he said he favored. Waite said that "the majority of women I know do not wish to have the burden of suffrage forced upon them. "I'm voting against the bill because so many four-flushers and dodgers have announced themselves for it," stated Mr. Richmond. On the other hand, Mr. Ainsley, whose name tops the roll call, declared himself proud to have the opportunity of leading off with a vote for suffrage. Mr. Miller, a bachelor, thought it incumbent upon him to come to the rescue of womankind when some of the married men were deserting. Mr. Thomas was willing to be called a four-flusher and said it would be a proud day for him when he could take his mother to the polls to cast her ballot. "I have three daughters and no sons," Mr. Stream (Republican) announced. "I have a democratic neighbor with three sons. I want to even up with him; therefore, I'm for this bill."

Garranza Denies Congratulating German Emperor

Mexico City, Tuesday, Feb. 6.—(Via Galveston, Feb. 7.)—The Mexican foreign office emphatically and officially tonight denied that Provisional President Carranza had telegraphed his congratulations to the German emperor on the international situation, as reported in a press dispatch from Amsterdam to El Universal. The foreign office explained that the only communication sent to the German emperor by General Carranza had been felicitations on the occasion of Emperor William's birthday, January 27.
