Asked to Sign Contracts

Washington, March 2.—News print paper jobbers of the country were asked by the Federal Trade commission today if they would reduce prices of news print to newspapers providing they benefited in the price fixing plan of the Federal Trade commission.

The commission wants assurance that jobbers, buying at a low price from manufacturers, will not hold publishers to contracts made at a high price. Already manufacturers and publishers have agreed to a price arbitration by the commission and if jobbers consent, the commistion and it jobbers consent, the commistee, it is believed, will go ahead immediately with its plan. The jobbers were asked with its plan. The jobbers were asked to sign agreements prepared by the commission. Some, it was indicated, were willing to approve the plan. Others have not made up their minds.


