"Twenty years at hard labor" was the sentence pronounced upon Julian Lopez, alias Julian Gonzales, one of the trio of Mexicans charged with the slaying of Special Agent Cross of the Milwaukee on the night of January 21. He pleaded guilty before Judge Sears of the district court to a charge of second degree murder. Lopez, together with two of his countrymen, Marcario Peres Romers and Minguel Aguirre, were in the act of robbing a freight car in the railroad yards when they were surprised by the detective. Cross, mortally wounded by the bullet fired by one of the Mexicans, kept pumping lead into the darkness from where the shot came until his strength gave out.
