

PREPARE CHARGES AGAINST ASKWITH

Patrolman Caught Drinking in Blind Tiger to Have Hearing Before Council.

SUSPENDED IN MEANWHILE

Chief of Police Dunn has prepared charges against Patrolman Harry Askwith, alleging that he violated one of the rules of the department by indulging in intoxicants while on duty.

Askwith, it is alleged, was in a place upstairs of 724 South Sixteenth street Thursday evening and that he conived at law violation in addition to violating a department rule by his personal conduct.

Also Suspended.

Askwith has been suspended by Chief Dunn, following investigation of charges that Askwith patronized a "blind tiger" on his beat Thursday night.

Sol and Louis Epstein, whose liddipping joint on the second floor of 724 South Sixteenth street was said to have been patronized by Askwith, were raided Friday and the men were locked up along with quantities of liquor and a slot machine.

Friday night police raided other resorts in the same neighborhood.

The Askwith shakeup in the police department followed report of Roy L. Mathis, 2614 St. Mary's avenue, that he had been robbed of \$27 by four men, whom he met in the Epstein after-hours thirst quenchery, where Mathis said he also bought drinks for Patrolman Askwith in full uniform.

Detectives Rooney, Brinkman and Unger, and Council Bluffs officers, arrested Owen Trapp, Twelfth street and Sixth avenue, and Fred Ritchie, 914 West Broadway, in the Bluffs Friday. They are held in the Omaha jail under charges of robbery.

Mathis has identified Trapp as the man who impersonated a detective and took Mathis' money. He has also identified Ritchie as the driver of the auto in which he was robbed. Two other men are still being sought in the case. Trapp and Ritchie assert they were drunk at the time they were with Mathis, and did not know what they did.

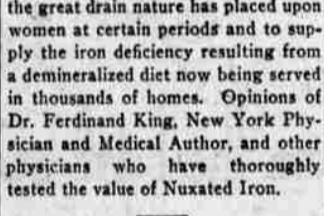
