### Inefficiency of U. S. Mail Service Shown by a Railway Postal Clerk

To the Editor of The Bee: Much has been said and written in regard to the delays of mail, the poor system of efficiency, and I would like to add a few words more if you will be so kind as to permit space in your paper. We have found out that not every paper will tackle this question, especially the democratic ones, as it is too much of a reflection on their administration. Should the postoffice appropriation bill come before congress including in it an amendment to raise the price of transportation you will see some swift action on the part of our senator from Nebraska denouncing it and fighting against such outrage; merely it would come out of his pocket. Example—last congress.

The latest and most serious of offenses the Postoffice department is perpetrating is to have clerks assigned in terminals work about nine and a half hours a day and seven days a week. Such an order came out recently through the division superintendent and chief clerk. The congestion of mail brought this about and so consequently we must submit for a while yet, but things are going

to take on better shape after a little, for this system of treating employees will some day be over and a good organization started that will demand of its government honesty, sincerity and good fellowship in their dealings; instead of graft, inefficiency and incompetency.

What was it that made the Tracy and Pierre clerks quit four or five years back? The stop-watch method of the department. There is money in the treasury for certain purposes, such as investigations, and also money will be spent for legal talent to fight for us. We must bring this to an issue and we will. Nothing less than restoring the service as it was will be asked and again giving the people their money's worth. A person sees patriotic speeches, etc., in the papers about what advantage the government is offering young men to go into government service. Rot! Come into the mail service and see what you get. If you won't do right according to your conscience you're fired by wire, like it happened to a chief clerk in Chicago, or will reduce you from superintendent to chief clerk and send you to Honolulu like it happened in the thirteenth division. I wonder if the department thinks they can work a clerk seven

days and get as much work out of him as to work him six days and let him rest one day? The department acknowledges that an awful congestion of mail exists or such an order as work every clerk seven days would not be issued. So we again call upon every business man to bring his influence upon the department and also the commercial clubs of all cities to bring about better American conditions instead of conditions which are.

#### Kansan Fined Limit for Assault on Aged Cripple

The stiffest fine that Police Judge Fitzgerald has yet levied upon a man charged with simple assault was imposed Wednesday morning upon Elmer E. Martin of Topeka, Kas. Martin was fined \$100 for battering a cripple 62 years old.

"I am guilty," said the prisoner, "but I would like to explain how it happened." Then he proceeded to tell how the old man had spoken in a surly manner to him while both were in the Metropolitan hotel at Twelfth and Douglas streets.

Patrolman Goss, who arrested Martin, said that the aged cripple's surlyness consisted of saying "no" when Martin demanded the key of the old man's room.

"I was released from jail only yesterday," Martin whined. "And you are going right back there," said the judge.

### Most of Young Recruits Want to Be Officers

"Every other applicant wants to be an officer," says Captain McKinley of the army recruiting station.

He is nearly swamped with applications and prospective applicants for the army officers' reserve corps, while applicants to be lowly privates in the ranks of regular fighting men could be much more numerous, he says, without overcrowding the army.

"We must fill the regular army before the reserve officers can be given places in case of war," he continues. "Every day a dozen or more fine young men volunteer to take examinations for entrance to the officers' reserve. That is praiseworthy and patriotic, but these would-be officers would make splendid soldiers, and that is what the army needs most in this crisis."

About thirty young men of Omaha have already applied for examination to enter the officers' reserve corps, mostly as second lieutenants. They would be called upon for active service only in case of war, when they would become officers in the regular army, or volunteers.

### Elkhorn River Reported To Be Cutting Its Banks

A large force of men from the county engineer's department was hurried to Waterloo when it was reported that the Elkhorn river was on a rampage, cutting great chunks out of the banks and otherwise damaging property. About twenty feet of bank has been eaten away at the Snieder bridge in the southern part of the county.
