

SPRING WHEAT IS RUSHED TO FARMERS

Grain Exchange Has Handled Ten Carloads, Five Being from Minnesota.

OUTLOOK IS NOT SO BAD

Spring wheat for the purpose of reseeding the fields of Nebraska continues to go forward to be distributed among the farmers. So far the Omaha Grain exchange has handled ten carloads, five having come in from Minnesota and the balance gathered up out of Omaha elevators and from points in the state.

The shipments made through the Omaha Grain exchange, however, constitutes only a portion of the spring wheat that has gone to the farmers. Secretary Manchester of the exchange has been able to get in touch with the situation and learns that all over the state elevator men and millers have taken hold of the seed proposition. Where they have had spring wheat on hand they have distributed the seed among the farmers and in a number of instances they have bought wheat outside and had it shipped in.

Bushel to the Acre.

It is figured that the shipments out of Omaha aggregate something like 15,000 bushels, and that this will seed close to 15,000 acres, the understanding being that as a rule farmers are sowing a bushel, or a little more, to the acre.

Numerous reports are reaching the Omaha Grain exchange, indicating that the wheat crop outlook is not as serious as indicated heretofore. Many of the grain and elevator men are writing and wiring in, saying that in numerous fields where the wheat plant was apparently dead the few warm days have caused it to show considerable green and take on apparent life. It is conceded that a warm rain within the next few days would work wonders in many fields. As a result, and hoping for the coming of rain, it is asserted that in many localities farmers have discontinued plowing up their fields and are going to wait and see what a few days will bring forth. They say they can afford to wait, for if it should develop that the wheat has been killed there will be plenty of time for fitting the ground and planting it to corn.
