THREE HITS OFF CURRIE

Colonel Murphy Currie from North Carolina subdued the Drummers with one run and three scattered blows yesterday afternoon and Pa Rourke's de luxe twenty-four cylinder machine breezed home with a 12 to 1 victory in a long and listless pastime which was cut short at the culmination of the seventh stanza on account of darkness.
