# SENATE MAKES' BIG WAR TAX REDUCTION FOR FRENCH HEALTH

Five Per Cent Tax on Manufacturers and Surtax on Incomes Eliminated by Finance Committee.

Washington, May 27.-Proposals for a 5 per cent tax on manufacturers' gross sales in many industries and for greatly increased surfaxes on big incomes were striken out of the war revenue bill yesterday by the senate finance committee, cutting down by many millions the total revenue provided for as the measure passed the house.

The manufacturers' sale tax was reected bodily, with the understanding that other and probably lower levies would be substituted later. After rewould be substituted fater. After re-fusing to accept the increased surfaxes en incomes of more than \$40,000 writ-ten into the bill during the house de-bate the committee approved the re-mainder of the income tax schedule virtually in the form in which it orig-inally was drafted by the house ways and means committee.

### Eliminate Flat Tax.

The decision to throw out the manufacturers' tax which would have affected producers of motor vehicles and many forms of merchandise, was prompted by a desire to eliminate the flat tax imposed upon business generally and to distribute the levy more equitably, the committeemen said. The section was designed to raise \$118, 750,000 annually, to be made up in whole or in part by other forms or lates of taxation.
