CARRIGAN FUNERAL
HELD HERE TUESDAY
Prominent Lumber Dealer Who
Had Been in Business in
Omaha for Fourteen
Years.

Edmond B. Carrigan died Sunday afternoon at his home, 4906 Davenport street. Mr. Carrigan was born in Olcott, N. Y., in 1867. His parents were Patrick and Mary Carrigan, both of whom came from Ireland. Edmond was one of five children. At 17 years of age Mr. Carrigan came west, going first to Kansas City. Having arrived there, he looked about for employment, and also made ar-

rangements to continue his studies in the night schools. His first position was secured with the Western Railway Weighing and Inspection bureau in Kansas City, and he remained in the employ of that company for three years. At the end of that time he resigned and accepted a position with the Central Coal and Coke company of Kansas City. In the interests of this concern he first came to Omaha, and this association was continued up until the time (some fourteen years ago) when he organized his own company, the E. B. Carrigan company, wholesale dealer in coal, City National Bank building.

Mr. Carrigan was deeply interested in the affairs of Omaha, as was evidenced by his serving on the traffic bureau and house committee of the Commercial club. He was also a member of the Happy Hollow club. At the time of his death he was an active worker in the Christian Science church and had served at different times as a director in both the First and Second churches of Christ, Scientist, of this city.

Mr. Carrigan survived by his mother, Mrs. Mary Carrigan, of Olcott, N. Y.; by three brothers, Charles of Olcott, N. Y.; Thomas J. of Iola, Kan., and Frank J. of Sioux City, Ia.; also by a sister, Mrs. Maggie McCarthy of Sanborn, N. Y., and by his wife, Mrs. Jessie B. Carrigan, and a 6-year-old son, Eugene B., both of Omaha.

Christian Science services were held yesterday at 2:30 o'clock at the Cole & McKay chapel, followed by interment at Forest Lawn cemetery.

Man in Navy Asks His Taxes Be Set Aside
Joseph F. Kramolisch, 4126 J. in active service in the navy since April 10, asks the city council of Omaha to help make provision to pay his taxes without selling his property here. The grounds of his petition set forth in a letter to the city commissioners are that his wife is ill and has to undergo an operation, and he is unable to pay his taxes. He has, he says, been in the navy four years prior to his recent resumption of services.

Council Should Decide On Material Used, Butler Says
The entire council should decide what material is to be used in street paving and not the department. Commissioner Butler told city commissioners. The question was raised by Commissioner Jardine, who asked what material he should order for a street paving job. After considerable debate, Butler was directed to bring in a resolution as to what he considered a proper method of procedure.

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Council Orders Unclaimed Street Warrants Canceled
The council directed the city comptroller to cancel all warrants for which no claim had been filed for opening and widening of streets prior to 1893, and directing that the special warrants revert back to the original funds and the general fund warrants to the general sinking fund.

A. R. Hansen Buys Big Ranch Near Chadron
Alfred R. Hansen of the Lincoln Inn has purchased a ranch of 1,840 acres in the Pine Ridge park, Daves county, from the Klokke Investment company. This ranch is located just ten miles south of Chadron and about fifteen miles from the ranch Mr. Hansen purchased a short time ago.

It is Mr. Hansen's idea to erect two or three sets of improvements on the property and get several hundred acres under cultivation. Altogether there are about 1,000 acres of the very best of farm land. Inasmuch as this is a good potato country, Mr. Hansen will no doubt supply his cafeteria with potatoes and other winter vegetables from this farm. For some time Mr. Hansen has been figuring on getting hold of a large block of land for this purpose. The consideration is said to be in the neighborhood of \$35,000 and the deal was handled through the Klokke Investment company and Harry Coffee of Chadron.

He will also erect his summer home on the ranch.

William Rocheford Dies In an Omaha Hospital
William Rocheford, 43, pioneer resident, died Monday night in a hospital. Funeral services will be held Thursday at 9 a. m. at St. Patrick's Catholic church. The body will be taken from the family residence, 1920 South Thirty-second street, at 8:15 a. m. Burial will be at Holy Sepulcher cemetery.

He was injured in an automobile accident at Twenty-second and Leavenworth streets four years ago, when his father was killed. Locomotor ataxia developed during the last few years and a recent accident added to his disabilities. Surviving members of the family are: Mrs. Celia Rocheford, mother; Mrs. W. S. Stryker, sister; Arthur, Fred, Elmer and Ector, brothers.

Mr. Rocheford was interested in the Douglas Shoe company and was engaged in the building contracting business for many years.

High Water in Missouri Causes Gouardi to Move
The rise of the stage of water in the Missouri river has driven to higher land the squad of soldiers guarding the east approach to the Union Pacific bridge. Formerly the men had their camp on the river bank, near the east end of the bridge. The rise in the river has flooded the bottoms and the camp has been moved onto the grade that years ago was used as the wagon road to the bridge.

While the boys on guard at the Union Pacific bridge have not made any complaint, it is said that they are in need of a table on which they can put books and writing material and several chairs for their tents.

RED CROSS DRIVE PUT OMAHA ON MAP
Gould Dietz, Back from Washington, Says East Takes Notice of the Gate City.

That the present Red Cross membership campaign has put Omaha on the map is the opinion of Gould Dietz, who returned yesterday from the national Red Cross convention in Washington, D. C. Thirty-seven cities were represented and some of the biggest men and women in the country were there.

We all got plenty of ginger and enthusiasm for the Red Cross week, June 18 to 25, when all the chapters in the United States will work as never before for the drive for \$100,000,000 for our men in the war and their families.

As it is next to impossible for anyone to see the president or secretary of war, because of the efforts to protect them from possible harm, ex-President Taft read the president's address to the convention.

Prominent Men Speak. General Pershing, Elliot Washburn of Boston, C. N. Bliss of New York, H. P. Davissoh, who was made chairman of the war council; Ian Malcolm, who came to America with the English delegation; Frederick Wolcott of Poland and John H. Gadey were some of the speakers who brought the war home to the Red Cross representatives.

So impressive were some of the speeches that one man broke down and was forced to leave the room. "We will give until it hurts us instead of waiting until half of our boys are killed to wake up to the seriousness of the war. The sooner we give all we can and send our men to France the quicker the war will end," is the opinion of eastern workers.

Wattles Back Wednesday. G. W. Wattles, chairman of the finance committee of the Omaha chapter, will return today from the east and will make plans at once for the Red Cross finance campaign in Omaha. "We expect to bring some big man to Omaha for the opening day of the campaign. I tried to urge William Howard Taft to come, but he said, 'You don't need me if you got 30,000 members in a week.'"

Mr. Dietz will name a committee to the Denver conference, June 7, at once. So great has the work at the local headquarters grown that it will be necessary to employ a paid director. It is also possible that Nebraska will have a director so that we will not have to refer chapters being formed to Chicago or Denver.

The ambulance company will soon be organized, as more than twice enough men have applied. Mr. Dietz will appoint a special ambulance committee, composed of seven doctors, at once. While in Washington Mrs. C. T. Kountze and Mr. Dietz had a conference with Mabel Boardman, who has given Mrs. Kountze much valuable information about the women's work in the war. Mrs. Kountze will return today.
