Today's British official statement does not mention any further fighting in the vicinity of Lens and apparently General Haig has not pressed further the attempt to advance made there yesterday, which was checked by violent counter attacks with heavy forces.

French Official Report.

Paris, June 4.—The Germans have forced their way into French advanced positions near Froidmont, the war office announced this morning.

The statement follows:

"The artillery fighting became violent late yesterday northwest of Froudmont farm. An attack at about 10 p. m. against the salient in our line enabled the enemy to get a footing in advanced positions. On the front of the Vauclere and Californie plateau the Germans did not renew their attacks after their sanguinary repulse yesterday, confining their efforts to rather heavy bombardment. "In the Champagne we made a surprise attack on the German trenches east of Teton, taking prisoners and capturing three machine guns." On June 2 and 3 our pilots brought down six German airplanes and one captive balloon. Our anti-aircraft guns brought down three machines, the occupants, of whom three were officers, were made prisoners. Enemy machines dropped bombs in the region of Nancy and on Dunkirk. It is reported that there were several victims among the civilian population of Dunkirk."
