Havana, Cuba May 25—President Menocal has vetoed a bill recently passed by the Cuban congress, which provided that no ship under Cuban registry should be cleared from any port of the republic unless the captain was a native or naturalized Cuban citizen.

In vetoing the bill President Menocal

inspired by ambitious Cubans who have been studying marine engineering in the hope that they might be able to become commanders of the several interned German ships recently seized by the Cuban government when diplomatic relations were broken off with that government.

General Astarhett, Russian, is among the latest escaped prisoners of war to arrive in Holland. He confirmed the accounts of the total inadequacy of prisoners' rations to sustain life. Questioned regarding the economic pressure in Germany, he expressed the belief that the Germans would never be forced to give in save by military defeat.
