Probability of Enacting of Food Control Bill Forces, Wheat Prices Down 2 to 4 Cents.
Chicago, Ill., June 25.—Considerable beartein influence was exerted on the grain markets today by the likelihood that the food control bill would become a law. Wheat finished 2c to 4c lower but steady, with July at \$3.10 and September at \$1.85. Corn and oats railled from depression, corn finishing the control of the advance, and oats unchanged to 4.6 % down. Provisions closed irregular, ranging from 25c decline to a rise of 2% disc.

Broad authority, which seemed very certain to regulate food distribution in pechaps less than a fortnight, put buils at an immediate disadvantage in the wheat trade. It was taken for grained that the effect of the new law would be to prevent in the future any extraordinary soaring of prices. Largely as a result, selling orders predominated in the market and there was little disposition to buy. Welcome rains in the spring wheat region, especially in the dry sections of North Dakots, tended further to weaken values.



(Arteraft-Five Resis.) Reviewed by Peter Milne WILD AND WOOLLY," Douglas Fairbanks' latest Artcraft picture, is an immensely clever burlesque on the Western melodrama until it reaches its climax, when it becomes a Western melodrama itself. Of laughs there are an innumerable amount. The original business so well planned and so well executed is, it must be confessed, the piece de resistance of the picture. Mr. Fairbanks in his role of Jeff is a son of wealth who has an idea of the Western plains gleaned from the dime novel and the musical comedy and the motion picture. He rigs up his room with all sorts of weirdly comical contraptions. The knocker on his door is a pistol, there is a tent in one corner of the room, a dummy horse, and he periodically vaults into the saddle, lets out a wild whoop (we suppose) and starts to lasso the furniture and the butler.


When the scene shifts to the real West, where the inhabitants of a certain town, having heard of his pre-generation ideas, have allowed themselves to drift back to the crudities of the eighties, the best burlesque is introduced. Various characters long identified with the serious Western melodrama—the bad man, the nonchalant gentleman who stands on the corner shooting at sundry marks, the cowboys, the sheriff, all of them shooting at sundry marks, the cowooys, the sheriti, and of their mare burlesqued to an uproarious degree. In between these characteristic scenes are interpolated such subtitles as "You ione right by our Nell," "We may take our whiskey straight, but we're squar' with our women," "There's a train leaving here at eight tonight, and unless you're on it I'm gunnin' for you." "Say, Pard—" and kindred lines so aptly used that practically every one registers.

every one registers. Then there comes the real melodrama, allowing Mr. Fairbanks to do some athletic stunts, not the least of which are hanging by a beam and pushing a hole through the ceiling with his feet, swooning down upon a band of drunken redskins and rescuing the heroine from their midst, whisking her to the back of his horse and calloping on and lassoing the real villain, to say nothing of vaulting great distances to his saddle. "Wild and Woolly" is in truth an ideal vehicle for Mr. Fairbanks. It ought to make even such a serious portrayer of Western melodramatic roles as William S. Hart rock in his seat with laughter.

One is easily able to understand why Mr. Fairbanks picked "Wild and Woolly" to star in, even though submitted anonymously, It is, however, extremely difficult to draw any line between the work of Horace B. Carpenter, author of the story, and that of Anita Loos, who did the scenario. So it must be hats off to both of them and another baring of the head to Director Of course, Mr. Fairbanks reigns supreme in the role of Jeff, He receives fine support from first to last. His new lead-ing lady, Elleen Percy, formerly in "The Century Girl," is as pretty as could be desired, and although she never has a big chance to act, she capably shares several dare-devil feats with
