THREE-I LEAGUE IS FORCED TO SUSPEND

War Conditions Compel Organization to Close Parks After Losing \$25,000 During Season.

Chicago, July 4.—War has forced the Three-I league, one of the oldest minor leagues of the country, to close its parks. The organization will suspend its season next Sunday, President A. R. Tearney announced today. The eight clubs have lost approximately \$25,000 since the start of the season eight weeks ago.

Although the league faced almost unprecedented weather conditions early in the season, President Tearney said subscriptions of the Liberty loan and Red Cross and the general lack of interest in the game, owing to the war, contributed largely to the league's failure.

"I have found that base ball has no business trying to survive in the smaller cities with the country at war," said President Tearney tonight. "The people have lost interest in base ball in the smaller cities where the war spirit is becoming more intense."

The closing of the Three-I makes the fourth league to suspend since the opening of the season two months ago. The Virginia league was the first to fall. Then the North Carolina league suspended after less than six weeks of operation. The Northern league gave up yesterday because of heavy financial losses. Several other leagues are reported to be near collapse.

Under the ruling of the National Association of Professional leagues, the Three-I will retain its player and territorial rights. Although the players were permitted to seek employment wherever possible for the remainder of the season, they will be obliged to report next spring to the club holding their contract this season. The Three-I league has been in operation eighteen years. It is composed of Peoria, Rock Island, Moline, Rockford, Quincy, Alton, Bloomington and Hannibal, Mo.

Peoria Seeks Franchise. Peoria, Ill., July 4.—That Peoria will seek a franchise in either the Central or Western leagues, was the announcement made here tonight by President Jack Ryan of the Peoria Fans' association when informed that the Three-I league season will suspend on Sunday.

Negotiations have already been started with officials of the Central league, it was said. Peoria has been leading the Three-I league race throughout the present season.

"K. O." Has Best of Ten-Round Bout With Harrison. Benton Harbor, Mich., July 4.—George "Knockout" Brown had a shade the better of Phil Harrison in a ten-round boxing match here today, which was supervised by the sheriff and prosecuting attorney. Governor Skepper telegraphed the sheriff to forbid the match, but the two county officials ruled that it was a boxing exhibition and therefore could be held. Brown and Harrison are middleweights and both hail from Chicago.

Norman Ross Breaks All A. A. U. Mile Swim Records. San Diego, Cal., July 4.—Norman Ross of the Olympic club of San Francisco today broke the National Amateur Athletic union record for the mile swim, making the distance in 24 minutes and 10 seconds. The record was held by Ludy Langer, whose time was 24 minutes, 59 1/2 seconds. The race was the first on the program of the Pacific coast championship event at Coronado Tent city.
