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MAJOR CHANGES IN ENGLISH SEA RULE

Numerous Shifts Are Expected to Result in More Direct Administration of Britain's Great Fleet.

London, Monday, Aug. 6.—(Delayed.)—Official announcement was made at the admiralty tonight that Admiral Sir Cecil Burney, second sea lord, had been replaced by Vice Admiral Sir Roselynn Wemyss, Alan Garrett Anderson, hitherto vice chairman of the wheat commission, succeeds Sir Erich Campbell Geddes, the new first lord of the admiralty, as controller of naval construction.

The changes in the British admiralty are attracting much attention and are expected to result in a reorganization which it is supposed Sir Erich Campbell Geddes, first lord of the admiralty, was appointed to carry out.

In quarters where the existing admiralty methods are regarded as unsatisfactory, the present step is denounced as a "procrustean half measure" and it is declared the change ought to have been so complete as to "give the country a resolute and energetic admiralty permeated by an offensive spirit."

Duties to Be Rearranged. An official statement contains the announcement that an opportunity is to be taken of the appointment of Vice Admiral Sir Roselynn Wemyss in rearranging the duties of the second sea lord of the admiralty, who will be relieved of detailed administrative work connected with the personnel of the fleet.

This is interpreted as meaning that the second sea lord will not be hampered by details which subordinate can handle, but will be associated more closely than his predecessor with the preparation of war plans.

Another change in the admiralty is the removal of Sir William Graham Green, from the permanent secretaryship at the admiralty to a secretaryship in the ministry of munitions under Winston Spencer Churchill. Sir William's departure from the admiralty is regarded as of considerable importance, as he has held since 1911, has been responsible for the continuity of the admiralty tradition and policy. It is this continuity which is regarded by many as a most dangerous factor in that it hinders initiative and adaptability to current needs.

Mrs. De Saules Will Ask to Be Removed to Hospital. Mineola, N. Y., Aug. 7.—An application for the removal to a hospital of Mrs. Bianca de Saules, held in the county jail here for the murder of her former husband, John Longer de Saules, is expected to be made today or Wednesday. This announcement was made by her attorney after three physicians had examined her client and decided that her life was being endangered by keeping her in prison.

The mother of Mrs. de Saules cabled from Valparaiso, Chile, that she will leave there Wednesday for New York with another daughter, Miss Amalie Errazuriz-Vergara, and her son, William Errazuriz. The message also said the mother would give every aid possible to her daughter, indicating that her wealth and influence of the family would be used only to defend the daughter, but to obtain the permanent custody of the 4 1/2-year-old son for the mother.

CHICAGO GRAIN AND PROVISIONS. Corn Open Lower Because of Rains, But Rises on Speculative Offerings. Chicago, Aug. 7.—Although generous rains that promised to enlarge the yield of corn had a bearing on the market today on prices of that cereal, the fact that rural offerings were not large and that no big movement of stock was expected today to a reaction. The market closed steady.

At first the corn market showed a decided downward tendency, owing to the emphasis which drizzling rains throughout the 135,000 acres of corn country had placed on the season's crop. Gossip was sure that as a result of favorable conditions which have prevailed in the past 121 days, there will be 100,000,000 bushels in excess of any previous record. The fact soon became evident that the market was expected to be large as most traders had expected from such circumstances. Then, too, talk grew somewhat general that no big movement from rural districts was to be expected, and the safety of the new crop had been more thoroughly assured. A material bulge in prices followed, and the upward opening of the market was noticeable, and in the end a small portion only of the gains were held.

Complaints of dry weather during the past 48 hours had been on the downward side, owing to increased arrivals of wheat from the domestic winter crop region. Prospects of a bumper yield of oats made the market relatively easy. There were forecasts that the government report tomorrow would show a likelihood of 200,000,000 bushels of oats being harvested this year, a case of a higher year.

Higher quotations on hogs put temporary strength into provisions. Holders were quick, though, to have the change reversed, and before the day was over the gains had all much more than been wiped out.
