(By Associated Press.)

Washington, Aug. 12.-Renewed emphasis was laid by Provost Marshal General Crowder today upon the fact that congress framed the army draft law in the interest of the nation, not the individual. For that reason the lines are being drawn tight in the

matter of exemptions. The government has acted slowly in bringing home to the people the rigid character of the act. There has been much discussion of the exemp-tion problem, based on an erroneous view of the law's purpose, which as-sumed that married men, for instance, would be exempted without question and that the burden of the military duty was to be carried fully by the single men among the 10,000,000 regis-

General Crowder has taken the position in recent rulings that married men will be exempted only when it is to the interest of the government that they should be excused from service. If the removal of the drafted man from his family circle probably would result in the family becoming a public burden it is to the interest of the government to leave him in his civil occupation so he can care for his dependents.
