ROURKES WIN IN EXCITING COMBAT

Two swell singles by Marry Krug and Ward Miller, two beautiful hectic heaves by Doc Manser and Hank Butcher, of the hated opposition and a neat and nifty double steal by Ward Miller and Fin Yardley, enabled the de luxe Rourke to trounce the pesky Grizzlies 2 to 1 yesterday afternoon, and thus make it fifty-fifty on the four-game series.
