

## Peace Debate in U. S. Senate to Be Blocked by Whips

Washington, Aug. 16,-Action to out into effect plans of leaders to forestall any attempt at open discussion of peace in the senate appeared imminent when that body convened today. Present plans call for executive sessions to consider closing the, doors for peace debate.

Senators of the so-called pacifist group were expected to oppose the secret session program.

The text of Pope Benedict's peace

note received here early today in cabled dispatches from London discloses that it does not differ from the unofficial outline previously received. The foundation of the pope's proposals for ending the world war are reduction of armaments, freedom of the seas, settlement of all international disputes by arbitration and that there shall be no retaliatory struggle for economic world supremacy after the war.

The text of the communication served to strengthen the prevalent opinion that there is no likelihood of the proposals being accepted in their present form. That public opinion in the allied countries, insistent on a favorable decisive culmination of hostili ties, will cause the offer to be rejected was generally conceded here.

London, Aug. 16 .- In the House of Commons today Noel Billing asked whether Premier Lloyd George could give assurance that in the event of a 'social, military or political crisis" during the recess steps would be taken lor Bonar Law replied affirmatively. Mr. Billing asked whether Parlia- federal grand jury. ment would be reassembled in the event of an armistice. "I should consider an armistice a crisis," the chancellor replied.
