

U. P. WILL ABANDON TRAINS AS WAR ACT

Service West of Gate City to Be Sharply Curtailed, Releasing Many Locomotives and Crews.

Purely as a war measure to conserve passenger equipment and that there may be more engine power available for handling freight, August 22 the Union Pacific will begin the consolidation of its passenger trains. On the date named No. 15, the Colorado Express, leaving Omaha at 4:20 each afternoon, and No. 3 the California Mail, leaving Omaha at 4:30 o'clock, will be consolidated into one train. This train will do local business to North Platte, where it will split and, taking the old numbers, No. 15 will run on to Denver and No. 3 to San Francisco, the same as now.

On the eastbound run No. 14, the Omaha train from Denver, will come to North Platte, where it will consolidate with No. 19, the San Francisco Limited, and do local business into Omaha, arriving at midnight, fifty-five minutes earlier than No. 10 gets in at the present time.

No. 4, the Portland train, will do local business through Nebraska, reaching here at 7 o'clock in the morning instead of at 6:50, as now.

To Release Engines.
The consolidation of these trains will enable the Union Pacific to release something like a dozen engines to go into the freight traffic and a half dozen train crews.

The rearrangement of passenger train service on the Union Pacific is only the beginning of what is to come within the next sixty days. While it is not likely that there will be many changes on the branch lines, as the service there is at the minimum, something radical is expected to occur on the main line.

According to the tentative lineup, and there is nothing to indicate that it will not stand, extra fare trains as such will be abandoned, Nos. 1 and 2, the Overland Limited, and Nos. 7 and 8, the Los Angeles Limited, will continue to run on schedules approximately the same as now, but they will be regular fare trains.

On all four of the crack trains that the Union Pacific is now running between Omaha and the Pacific coast about September 15, the date of the close of the tourist season, tourist and chair cars will be added to the equipment and they will carry all persons who are provided with first class tickets, the bonus, or extra fare, for riding them being eliminated.

Omaha Girls Are Only Slightly Hurt in Wreck

Ila and Edna Bridges, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Bridges, 2911 South Eighteenth street, have returned from Chicago, where they were in a railroad wreck with Florence M. Hoye, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred H. Hoye, 2010 Oak street.

Miss Hoye, at first reported severely injured, suffered only minor bruises and a shock. She is expected home this week. Edna Bridges suffered laceration of a knee.

The wreck occurred at the Great Lakes Naval Training station. A local train, in which the three Omaha women were seated, was crashed into by a Chicago, North Shore & Milwaukee railroad train.

A sham battle which was in progress at the training station at the time of the wreck was not interrupted. Ambulances and surgeons were summoned from the "battleground" without apprising thousands of spectators of the wreck.

Opening of New Drying Plant is Postponed

Opening of the South Side fruit and vegetable drying plant, scheduled for Saturday night, has been postponed until Monday evening. The Women Voters' Conservation league was forced to change the date because Prof. C. W. Pugsley of the state university, who was to give the demonstration, is unable to come Saturday. South Side merchants also requested the date to be changed so they, too, might attend the opening.

River Baptismal Service Will Take Place Sunday

Four disciples of the Pleasant Green Baptist church, 1417 North Twenty-fourth street, will be baptised in the Missouri river Sunday at the foot of Pacific street. Rev. J. Costello, pastor of the Pleasant Green church, will preside. The baptismal services will take place at 3 o'clock. Persons desiring to come to the services should take the Harney car, alighting at Poppleton avenue, and walk two blocks east.

EXPRESS SERVICE TO BE CURTAILED

Collection and Delivery of Parcels to Cease at Five O'clock, Beginning on August 27.

Beginning August 27, the express companies in Omaha will shut off all deliveries and collections of parcels after 5 o'clock in the afternoon.

This is part of a movement recommended by the whole country by the National Council of Defense. It was recommended because it was believed it would work toward the release of a number of baggage cars.

Omaha expressmen say this will release at least six baggage cars daily in Omaha, as it has released many all over the east already. The Adams Express company alone, it is said, will release two cars by cutting off its collection of parcels at 5 o'clock.

The parcels thus coming in earlier in the day can be assembled earlier and sent out on the earlier trains, so that the trains which come later in the evening will not find Omaha with a heavy demand for baggage cars.

Perishable Goods Excepted.

One exception only is made in the deliveries. Perishable goods will be delivered after 5 o'clock to save them.

It is thought by the express companies that this new system will be especially pleasing to some of the employees, especially teamsters, since it will mean that they can get away from the office by 6 o'clock, whereas when they delivered and collected up to 6 o'clock they seldom got away before 7 or 7:30. The assembling of parcels and the caring for the teams took the remainder of the time.

Credit Men Plan to Aid Boys in the Army

Credit men of the Omaha association plan to give any aid in their power to army men affiliated with credit men's organizations, the country over. President E. H. Ward of the local organization and Manager E. E. Glosson, acting on the authority of the organization, wishes to extend to any soldiers here or elsewhere. Similar policies have been pursued by credit men in other cities and the work of the local body will be reciprocal in character and in addition it is the wish that army men who may have an affiliation whatever with associations in the United States may feel free to command the aid or counsel of Omaha men.

The National Credit Men's association donated \$4,000 to the Red Cross and the present work is in line with patriotic endeavor and is freely bestowed. Manager Glosson's office is at 217 Kärbach block.

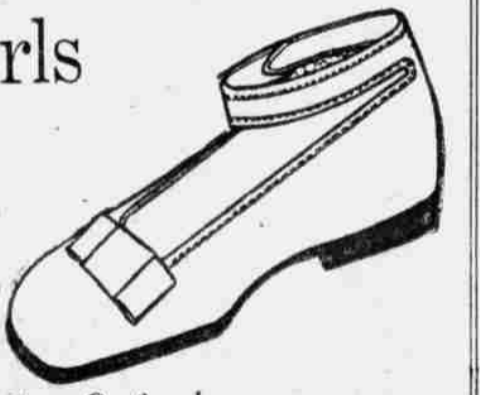
