The num-ber was without any semblance of demokal-zation, but also without signs of support During the mid-session railies of I to 3 points were registered chiefly in equip-ments, shippings and specialities the list became unsettled again at the close, mainly

on the higher money rates, call loans advancing to 6 per cent.

For the most part losses were materially reduced and in a few instances altogether wiped out. United States Steel was the most noteworthy exception, reacting just before the close on a renewal of heavy offerings. ings.

Steel opened with 35,000 shares at \$1.11\frac{1}{2}\text{ to \$1.12\frac{1}{2}\text{ thinus the regular and extra dividends of \$4\frac{1}{2}\text{ per cent.}} Soon it fell to \$1.03\frac{1}{2}\text{ rebounded to \$1.10\frac{1}{2}\text{ and as suddenly dropped back, closing at \$1.03\frac{1}{2}\text{ a net loss of \$2\frac{1}{2}\text{ points.}}
