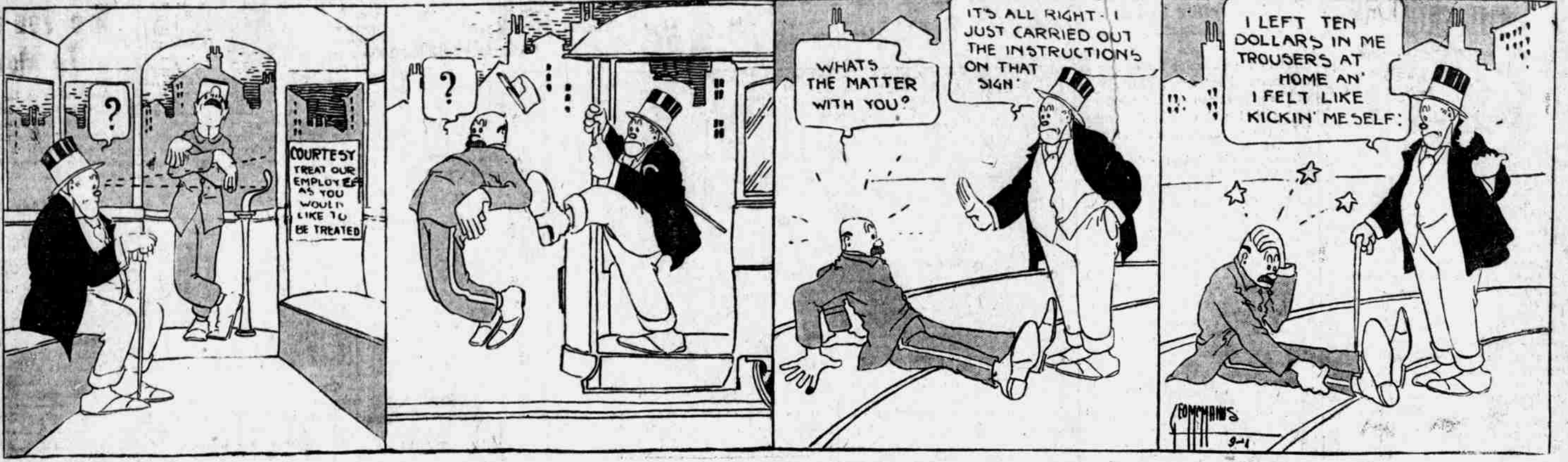

DUCKLINGS BITE BACK AT OMAHA

In Ten-Inning Duel Jack Halla, Downs Marty O'Toole; Lincoln Scores on Thomason's Triple.

Lincoln, Neb., Aug. 31.—(Special Telegram).—The Ducklings grabbed an extra-inning game with the Rourkes here this afternoon, 2 to 1, after "Ump" Brown had beaten the visitors out of it on a rank decision which even the bleachers hooted.

Halla and O'Toole engaged in a tight pitching duel, with honors fairly evenly distributed. The Ducks played snappy ball in the field, in marked contrast to the exhibition which they staged yesterday, but even at that Omaha should have won the game.
