

Former German Vessels **Given American Names**

Washington, Sept. 1 .- Almost all former German vessels now in the American navy have been given new names. Secretary Daniels issued an order today changing the names of twelve ships as a result of his attention having been called last week to the embarrassment the sailors were subjected to by being compelled to wear upon their hat bands names such as Kaiser Wilhelm II. The newly named ships are:

Vaterland to Leviathan, Kronprinzessin Cecilie to Mount Vernon, Kaiser Wilhelm II to Agamemnon, Amerika to America, Hamburg to Powhatan, Grosser Kurfurst to Acolus. Koenig Wilhelm II to Madawaska, Neckar to Antigone, Rhein to Susquehanna, Princess Irene to Pocanhontas, Frederick der Grosse to Huron, Barbarossa to Mercury. The vessels George Washington, President Grant and President Lin-




