Omaha won both ends of a double-header from St. Joseph yesterday, taking the first game, 3 to 2, and the second, 11 to 2.

The first game was a pitching duel between Marty O'Toole and Gaspar and Sutherland. O'Toole had all the best of it and deserved the victory which came in the ninth inning.

Otto Nye's pinch hit won Omaha victory in the ninth. The score stood 2 and 2 when the home half of the ninth opened. Fin Yardley drew a walk and was sacrificed to second by the slats. Thompson was hit in the bottom by a pitched ball and then Nye came to bat with a single to left, which scored Yardley with the winning tally.

Omaha scored two runs in the first inning on hits by Williams, Miller and Shaw.

O'Toole held the Saints to three hits and two of them were mighty scratchy. Breaks in the luck gave the Saints their two scores in the seventh.

Three Saints were fired from the combat in the first game. Pitcher Rose was the first, then Healy and finally Gaspar were chased by Umps Daly.

The second game was a swiftest. Omaha landed on Bremerhoff in the fourth stanza and before they finished they had marked up six runs and dispatched Mr. Bremerhoff for good. Sutherland, who finished the second game, too, was pounded hard in the seventh and eighth, when the Rourkes marked up five more runs for fun.

FULTON WINS FROM MORRIS ON A FOUL

Morris was Mobbed by Angry Spectators After Losing the Right to Battle With Jess Willard.

Canton, O., Sept. 3.—Carl Morris of Oklahoma City was disqualified in the sixth round of his scheduled fifteen-round go with Fred Fulton of Minnesota this afternoon for continual butting. Fulton had a big lead when Referee Matt Hinkel stopped the bout. Morris was mobbed by angry spectators as he left the ring. Morris was not badly hurt.

Morris and Fulton were battling for the right to meet Jess Willard, heavyweight champion. The titleholder had agreed to meet the winner.

Fulton tried to leave the arena at the end of the fifth round, but was held in the ring by his handlers. Once during the sixth round Fulton started to his corner, saying, "I'm not going to fight any more," but Referee Hinkel ordered him to continue and Fulton resumed the battle.

Fulton proved a better boxer and was benefited by the clean break rules. Morris took the aggressive in the first round and forced the going throughout.

Morris worked with both hands for the head, while Fulton caught Morris coming in with left jabs and left uppercuts to the head.

Referee Hinkel said after the bout: "I was forced to disqualify Morris after I had warned him a dozen times for butting and for hitting in the breaks."

Will Devore of Akron and Kid Wolfe of Cleveland, featherweights, boxed ten rounds to a draw as the curtain rang. On account of threatening weather the Fulton-Morris bout followed the curtain raise.

Chevrolet Lands Long Speedway Feature Race

Chicago, Sept. 3.—After winning the first two races of twenty and fifty miles, Ralph De Palma lost the 100-mile event to Louis Chevrolet at the speedway today, because he was forced to stop in the sixty-eighth to change a tire.

The Frenchman's time for the 100 miles was 56:29:05. He averaged 106½ miles an hour. Dave Lewis was second and De Palma third.

Ralph De Palma won the twenty-mile race, covering the distance in 11:02:07, a new track record. De Palma's average was 108.9 miles an hour. Gaston Chevrolet was second.

De Palma also won the second race, speeding the fifty miles in 28:09:00, averaging 106 miles an hour. He finished a quarter mile ahead of Dave Lewis, who captured second place.

De Palma and Louis Chevrolet fought a thrilling race for the first half of the 100-mile event, Chevrolet throwing the way by a few feet. The time for the distance was 28:36. Tom Alley gave the spectators a scare by throwing a racer wheel, while racing past the grandstand. He managed to keep the car on the track.
