Speculative Selling Resumed; Bears Move With Caution, in View of Yesterday's Display of Strength.

New York, Sept. 16.—A diminished demand for stocks today led to resumption of speculative selling and prices were again depressed, although losses in most instances were small. Trading was light and the disappearance of the strength, which characterised yesterday's market, was due less to bearish tactics than to absence of support. Total sales were 190,000 shares.

At the opening price changes were small and irregular with no appearance on initiative on either side of the market. The bears moved with eaution, in view of yesterday's display of strength, and made little effort to influence the course of prices until it became apparent that few buying orders were on hand. Stocks then came on the market in greater supply and the list eased off. Quotations stiffened temporarily in the second hour, but the rally was not held and the close was heavy. The remewed heaviness of the market apparently was due principally to professional selling, although the day's news contributed to this end. Petrograd dispatches indicating that new complications had arisen in the Russian political situation, reports of the presence of a hostile submarine in the western Atlantic and report that industrial taxation would be largely increased, tended to depress the market.
