swiftly backward several times, but in every
case the reaction failed to last and the
absorptive power of the market held out
robust to the end. Freezing weather was
reported at Minot, N. D., and unsettled,
cooler conditions were indicated for a big
portion of the corn belt.

Oats fluctuated with corn, but showed
less buoyancy on account of the comparative slowness of cash demand, both seafully steady.
