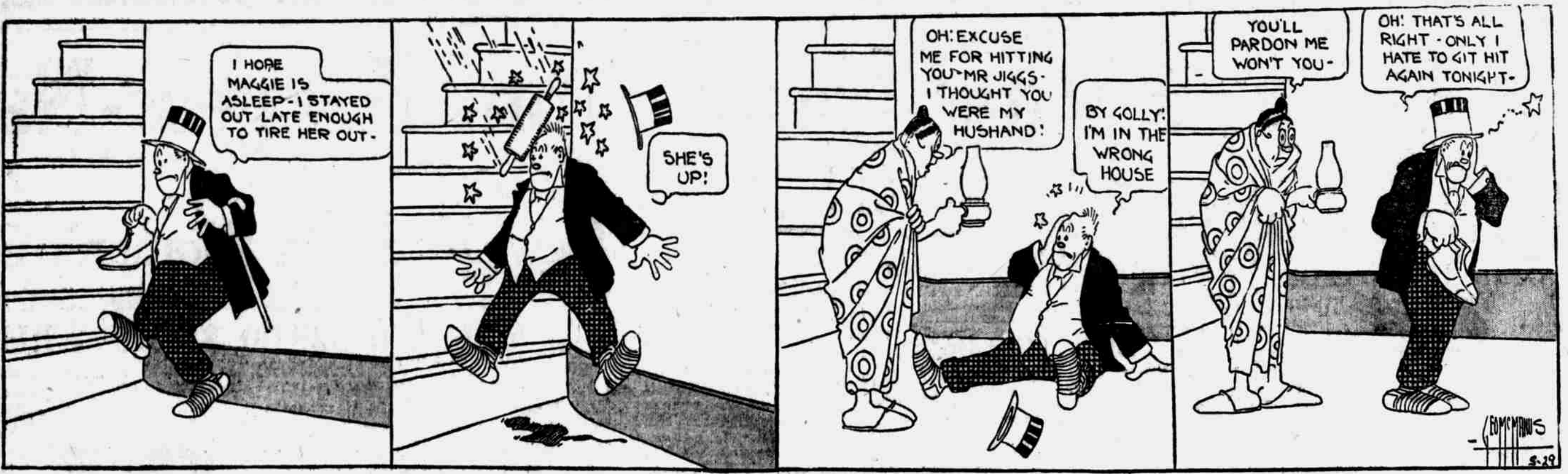

HUTCHIES CAPTURE THIRD OFF BOOSTERS

Walk Away With Their First Victory in Post-Season Series With Des Moines, Five to One.

Hutchinson, Kan., Sept. 28.—(Special Telegram.)—Hutchinson won the opening game of the post-season series for the Western league championship here today, 5 to 1, Lefty Graham winning from three Des Moines hurlers.  
Jack Holland's club started off in the lead and was never in danger, the lone Booster score being the result of a walk, a single by Breen, a pinch hit, and a single by Ewaldt.  
Graham held Des Moines hitless until the fifth inning. Gallo, who was wild, was jerked, Drexler pitching airtight ball until relieved for a pinch hitter. Hutchinson scored three in the first on walks to McCabe and Benson and successive singles by McClellan and Shay, McClellan scoring on Coffey's error.  
In the third Art Shay hit the longest fly ball seen on the field this season, knocking a home run over the left field fence.  
The last run came in the eighth on an error by Hartford, who threw low at first on Benson's grounder, Benson scoring on McClellan's single to center.  
The fielding was fast, three double plays being made. A big crowd turned out, fans coming from all nearby towns, a few from Des Moines.  
President E. W. Dickerson announced games for Saturday and Sunday here, and if more are needed, they will be played at Wichita. Score: HUTCHINSON, 5; DES MOINES, 1.

Mobile Cut Off; Terrific Hurricane Ravages City

New Orleans, Sept. 28.—All telephone and telegraph wires to Mobile were swept away by the tropical hurricane late today, cutting off communication with the city. At last reports the wind there was blowing thirty miles an hour and some property damage had been done.

Odell of Omaha Vice President of Dry Farming Congress

Peoria, Ill., Sept. 28.—George A. Smith of Salt Lake City, Utah, retiring president of the International Irrigation Congress, was today elected president of the International Dry Farming Congress, at the closing business session of the farm congress here.  
Other officers elected were: First vice president, Frank G. Odell, Omaha; second vice president, T. J. Harrison, Winnipeg, Man.; third vice president, H. M. Bayner, Topeka, Kan.  
The farm congress adopted resolutions declaring "we deem it our first duty and privilege to align ourselves squarely with the president, his administration, the army and navy; we pledge the richness of our fields, the wealth of our flocks, and, as need comes, the support of our firebrands."  
The resolutions also favor farm crop rotation, continuance of extension work among the farmers and housewives, ask stringent rules to prevent abuse of sale privileges of Indian lands, express thanks to the Department of Labor for aid in securing farm lands, urge better marketing facilities, advocate further establishment of consolidated schools, urge further conservation of foodstuffs and say "establishing a minimum price at this time for wheat is proper and correct. We approve the action, expecting an untimely price adjustment of other commodities to correspond."

Friscio Line Raises Pay of Telegraphers

St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 28.—Announcement was made today that, effective next Monday, station agents, agent-telegraph operators, telegraphers and other station employees of the St. Louis & San Francisco railroad and yard clerks and clerks in the general offices who have not received an increase since January 1, will be granted a wage increase of 8 to 10 per cent.
