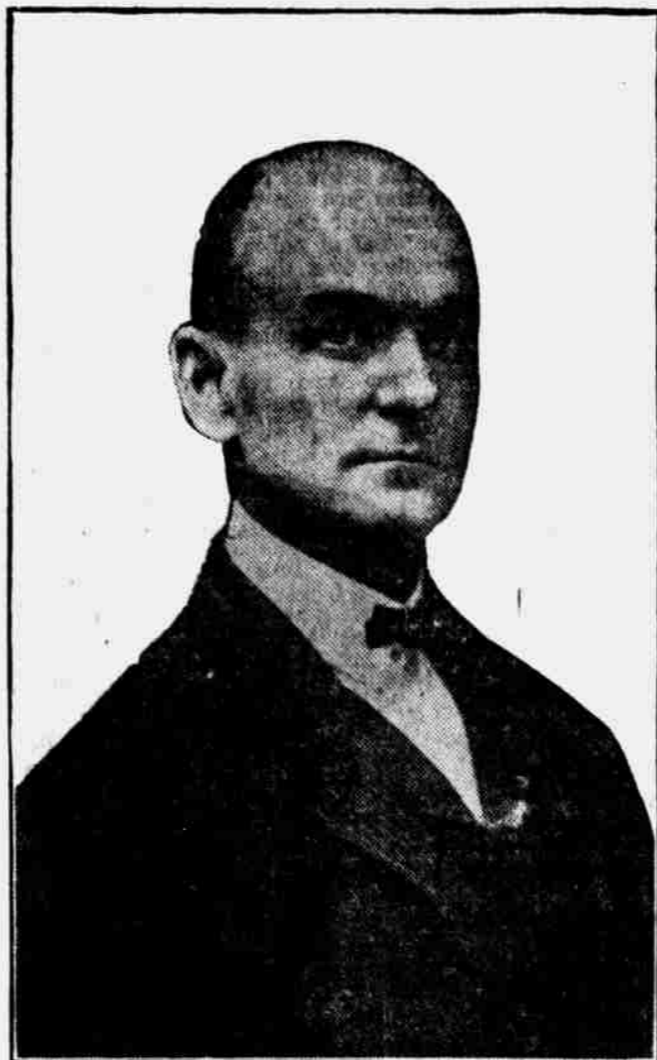

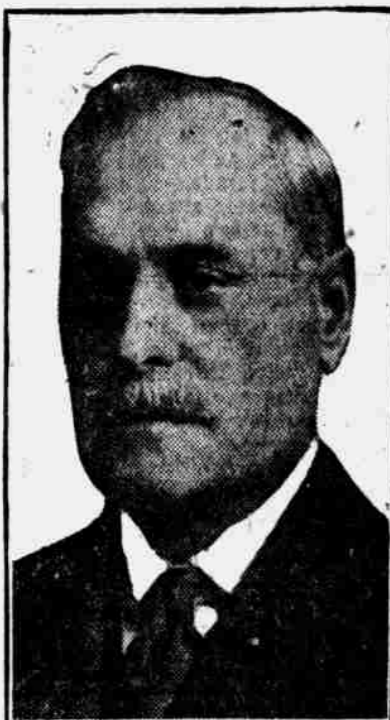

Omaha's Municipal Government

Omaha is one of the largest cities in the United States conducted under a commission form of government, dating from May, 1912.

As applied to Omaha, seven commissioners are elected every three years. Fourteen are nominated at the primaries and from this number seven are chosen at the election by a nonpartisan ballot.

The seven commissioners are responsible for all municipal business, all other city officers being appointed by the commissioners except the police and municipal judges.

The seven departments under the commission form of government are Superintendent of Public Affairs and Mayor, Superintendent of Accounts and Finances and Acting Mayor in the absence of the Mayor; Superintendent of Police and Sanitation; Superintendent of Fire and Water Supply; Superintendent of Public Improvements; Superintendent of Street Cleaning and Maintenance; Superintendent of Parks and Public Property.

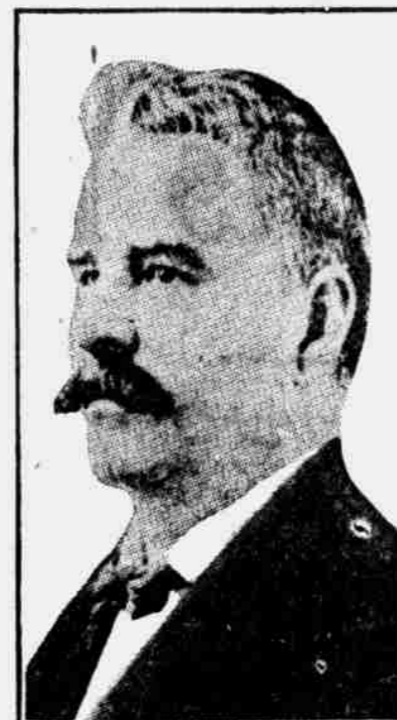
Omaha's first set of commissioners comprised James C. Dahlman, Dan B. Butler, A. C. Kugel, Charles Withnell, Joe Hummel, Tom McGovern and J. J. Ryder. They were in office from May, 1912, to May, 1915, when Dahlman, Butler, Kugel, Withnell and Hummel were re-elected and W. S. Jardine and John C. Drexel succeeded McGovern and Ryder. Drexel died in office and George Parks was appointed to take his place.
