GREAT BRITAIN MAY SELL FIVE VESSELS
Committee of Shipping Advises This Method to Recoup Country for Losses Sustained on Seas.

London, Oct. 3.—Vessels captured or seized by Great Britain from its enemies during the war in restitution for the destruction and plunder of the countries and shipping of the allies, should be sold and the proceeds applied as part of the war indemnity.

The committee asserts that in determining Britain's trade policy to be adopted after the war it should be the first care of the state to do nothing to impair the "pre-eminence position the United Kingdom holds in the international trade of the world."

The ruling principle of our trade policy after the war should consist in the maintenance for each individual citizen of the fullest possible opportunities for the exercise of his energies and enterprise in the markets of the world.

Status of Greece Not Yet Clear to All Governments
Athens, Oct. 4.—The Greek government holds that Greece is at war, but is not yet clear on the status of Greece as a belligerent.

The difference is not only a technical one, but it is of such importance whether a country is, or is not, at war. Foreign governments are obliged to shape their relations to it, as at war, or not at war.

German Vessels Used by Uncle Sam in Philippines
Manila, Oct. 4.—Seven German vessels seized in the Philippines at the outbreak of the war, have now been detailed to inter-island service by the United States government.

These vessels are to be used in relieving the shipping famine in the islands. With increased prosperity due to war demands for Philippine products and the withdrawal of several inter-island vessels for more profitable foreign routes.
