FACTS WORTH KNOWING.  
Do you know—that if somebody makes you a present of some hand-

kerchiefs, adorned with dainty touches of embroidery in delicate colors, and you do not want them to fade in the process of washing, you may set the colors by soaking the handkerchiefs—before washing them, of course—in a pail of lukewarm water, into which one tablespoon of turpentine has been thoroughly mixed?

Sponges should be rinsed in cold water immediately after use. Whenever possible they should be hung up to air, and not be left lying in a damp condition.

Should the knob come off the lid of a kettle a screw should be slipped through the hole with the head to the inside of the lid and a cork screwed on the protruding end.

After washing overalls or shirts that have become very soiled, soak them for an hour in weak cold water starch, and afterward wring out and dry. The next time you wash them the dirt will come out easily.
