Cash corn was only in fair demand, a few of the local elevator men putting in bids for small quantities. Cash quotations were un-changed to 4c higher, the No. 3 white selling at \$2.04, Saturday's price; while the bulk of the No. 2 mixed sold at the 4c advance. No. 2 white was up a half cent, this grade selling at \$2.05\forall, and the No. 2 yellow sold at \$1.92, 2c over Saturday's sales of the same grade. No. 2 mixed ranged from \$1.88 to \$1.91. Corn futures were much stronger and several samples were held over for better prices. Carlot receipts were 61 cars.

Oats were a little higher, reflecting the strength in corn and sold up \(\frac{1}{2} \) c. Arrivals were quite heavy with 102 cars, but many
