

THREE KILLED IN AUTO ACCIDENTS HERE LAST NIGHT

Former Councilman Run Over
By Army Auto Truck; Two
Killed When Car Skids
Off Road.

Three men were killed in auto accidents in Omaha Friday evening.

Thomas McGovern, former city commissioner, died last night at 9 o'clock as a result of injuries suffered when he was struck late Friday afternoon by a government auto truck at Sixteenth and Cass streets.

while he was crossing the street. Immediately following the accident Mr. McGovern was taken to his home 2615 Chicago street by Sergeant Enz of Fort Omaha, driver of the machine, and was found to have suffered a broken collar bone, a fractured arm and serious internal injuries. Enz has been ordered to appear at Central station.

Two Others Killed.

F. A. Schick, living at the Harley hotel, and Tom S. Perkins of Sioux City, Ia., were killed at 9 o'clock Friday night, when Schick's automobile swerved from the Carter Lake boulevard, upset and pinned both men beneath it. Schick's neck was broken by the fall and Perkins' death was due to strangulation, produced by the weight of the car. The machine was a two-passenger roadster.

Prominent in Sioux City.

Tom Perkins was 36 years old and leaves several brothers and sisters, all of whom live at Sioux City. Both men are prominent in business circles. F. A. Schick being manager of the Globe Automatic Sprinkler company and T. S. Perkins was one of the owners of the Sioux City Journal, son of the late George D. Perkins, one of the old-time newspaper, and political leaders of the Hawkeye state. The bodies were taken to the Bralley & Dorrance undertaking parlors. Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

Tom Perkins was a brother of Sam J. Perkins and Will R. Perkins, Mrs. Flora P. Lublum and Mrs. William H. Sammons. He was 36 years old.

McGovern Here Since 1886. Thomas McGovern was born in Ireland in 1862 and came to America when he was 15 years of age. In 1886 he came to Omaha and started to work at the Union Pacific headquarters where he was advanced to several responsible positions. Later he was employed by the Street Railway company as a special officer from whence he worked on the Omaha po-

To Celebrate the 400th Anniversary of the Reformation with Meeting at Omaha Auditorium This Afternoon

The 400th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation will be celebrated today by Lutherans of the synodical conference in Omaha, who will hold a meeting in the Auditorium beginning at 2:30 p. m. It is open to everybody and will be attended by Lutherans of all synods and conferences and by many people of other churches.

Prof. W. H. T. Dau and Prof. Francis Pieper, D. D., both of Concordia seminary, St. Louis, Mo., are among the speakers. A specially trained chorus will sing and there will also be singing by the entire audience.

Fixes the Date.

"The exact date which marks the beginning of the great religious movement of which Martin Luther was the central figure was October 31, 1517," said Rev. Titus Lang, pastor of the First Evangelical Lutheran church. "On that date Luther nailed to the door of the church in Wittenberg his celebrated 95 theses. They were propositions drawn up by Luther, who at the time was an Augustinian monk and a lecturer on theology at the great university. They were intended for discussion between the doctors of the school. Luther never meant that they should be a public document. This is seen from the fact that they were written in Latin. It was the custom of the times to display such documents and subjects for debate for the student body and the teachers."

"The reason for these theses was the scandalous abuse of the sale of indulgences or forgiveness by a monk named Tetzel. In this poster Luther did not yet attack the doctrine of indulgences itself, but he assailed the abuse. Unconsciously, however, he expressed the vital principle of the Reformation by the decided reference

to faith in Christ as the only ground of forgiveness and salvation.

Here Before Pilgrims.

"Lutheranism in America dates from the time when a Lutheran minister preached in America and died on American soil a year before the Pilgrim Fathers landed on Plymouth Rock. He was Rasmus Jensen, the pastor of 66 settlers from Denmark, who arrived at Hudson Bay in August, 1619.

"Today the Lutheran church, while

making the language of the country prominent in its work, preaches the faith of Luther in the land of Washington in 20 languages.

"Lutheranism and Americanism—both are great, and the greatness in both is liberty. In the former it is spiritual liberty and in the latter it is national, religious, political and personal liberty.

"Schaff-Herzog says of Luther: 'He embodies in his single person the boldness of the battlefield, the song of the musician, the joy and care of the parent, the skill of the writer, the force of the orator and the sincerity of rugged manhood, with the humility of the Christian.'
