CHICAGO GRAIN AND PROVISIONS Weakness of New York Stock Leads to De-eline in Corn.

Chicago, Oct. 31.—Material declines took place today in the value of corn, largely as a result of weakness in the New York

sas a result of weakness in the New York stock market and owing to weather conditions adapted to husking and to the rural movement of new grain. The close was steady but % to 1 cent net lower with December \$1.17% and May \$1.13 to \$1.13%. Oats lost a shade to ½0 ¼. The finish in provisions ranged from 25 cents off to a rise of 25 cents.

Throughout the day, selling pressure and lack of support tended to bring down the corn market. Liquidation of stocks appeared to be more generally taken than heretofore as a signal for unleading by many holders of corn who would otherwise have withstood the bearish influence of clear skies and freezing temperatures. Reports that an unusually large amount of new corn was turning out to be of unsatisfactory grade was variously construed, bears asserting emphatically that much more soft corn would be available for December delivery.
