Milk Prices in Omaha

Not to Go Higher-Corliss "In my opinion Omaha milk prices will not go any higher," said Leroy Corliss, president of the Alamito Dairy company and the Waterloo Creamery company, this morning. "While it is true the extremely high cost of feed and help has greatly increased the cost of production, the joint operation of the Waterloo Creamery company and the Alamito ing in operating expense and invest-ment, which will make it possible to reduce the cost of the distribution of milk in Omaha.


