Bad Weather Keeps Down Run Receipts Show Slight Increase Oats Off and Demand Slow; Rye and Barley Are Strong.

> Omahs, Dec. 7, 1917. Receipts of grain today showed a slight increase over those of yesterday, a total of 144 cars arriving in. Wheat receipts were 28 cars, and arrivals of corn 71 cars, and

those of oats 42 cars.

A dispatch from Washington says that Food Administrator Hoover has placed an embargo on shipments of corn and oats into territory south of the Canadian border, east of Wisconsin and Indiana and north of the Ohio and Potomac rivers. This embargo will go into effect at the close of business December 5 and is to relieve the congestion of the eastern roads and to divert as much of the export business as possible to the gulf ports instead of Atlantic seaboard points and will facilitate greatly in the movement of cars for the carrying of grain in the west.

Cash corn was in fairly good demand, and the bulk of the samples received graded No. 4 and No. 5. The corn in this territory is considerably better than that raised further east, as the grain arriving here now is sound and of nice coler, while farmers in the bigs corn states of Illinois and In-diana have considerable amount of soft stuff on hand which can not be moved. Cash quotations here were about unchanged. No. 3 white sold at \$1.62 and No. 4 white at \$1.64 and \$1.60. No. 4 yellow sold at \$1.58 and \$1.63 and No. 5 white at \$1.52 and \$1.54.

Oats were %c off and the demand for this cereal unusually slow, only a few samples being disposed of, the No. 3 white selling at 74c and 4 white cats at 74%c. Sample grade cats sold at 73%c and 74c. grade cats sold at 73 %c and 74c.
