The committee recommended for passage a street car regulatory ordinance which provides that the company shall maintain reasonable and fixed time schedules, operate sufficient number of cars, bring cars to full stops for passengers and require cars at interesections to stop for oncoming cars when the latter are within reasonable distance.

Three to Investigate.

A standing committee of three city commissioners will investigate and recommend actions advisable and necessary to make this new ordinance workable.

Corporation Counsel Lambert made this comment: "When representatives of the street car company appear before the state railway commission they contend that commission has no power to regulate the company; and when they appear before this city council, they make a similar claim. They won't admit anybody has power to regulate the company."

"At the eleventh hour the state rail. way commission is taking a sudden interest in street railway affairs. There's something dark in the woodpile," said Commissioner Butler.


