Kansas City, Mo., Feb. 5 .- The Western league will be in the field this year, with Omaha, Des Moines, Wichita, St. Joseph and Joplin certain of membership, according to E. W. Dickerson, president of the league.

Owing to the destruction by fire of the park at Lincoln, Neb., recently, there is some doubt whether that club will be on the circuit this year, Mr. Dickerson said. Sioux City is bidding strongly for the Lincoln franchise, he declared. Topeka is

That Denver probably will not be in the league this year is indicated by the president, who said:
