### Refutes Charge That Omaha Pawnshops Lure Minors

Isidore Friedman, clothier and eweler at 1211 Douglas street, protests against the statements of Bennie Thomas published in an evening paper to the effect that Omaha nawnshops sell firearms to minors. "I am a trustee of the Omaha Second Hand Clothing and Jewelry society," said Mr. Friedman. "I have been in the Business in Omaha for the last 24 years and in justice to myself and other members of the association I feel that our position should stand corrected in the eyes of the public.

"We never sell firearms or any other article to minors unless they are accompanied by their parents or guardian. Neither do we purchase second hand good that they offer for sale. Frequently they say they will go to other stores where they can make purchases and we advise them to go knowing they will be treated in the same manner in all stores in Omaha under agreement of the association.

"Elder persons buy from us and sell to minors and we are blamed unjustly. Our window displays of slingshots, brass knucks and billies and revolvers are for sale to watchmen, street car conductors and motormen who need them for protection and are never sold to minors."
