· **HIGH COURT FIXES** DAMAGE LIMIT IN **GRAIN CONTRACT**

Nebraska Supreme Tribuna Decides Case in Which Baltimore Firm Brought Suit Against Updikes.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) Lincoln, March 2 .- (Special.) - The supreme court has reversed a judgment for \$14,014.16 obtained by John T. Fahey et al. of Baltimore against the Updike Elevator company of Omaha in the Douglas county district court for failure to carry out an alleged contract to deliver 100,000 bushels of wheat to them, shipment to be made in August, 1914.

The elevator company admitted the contracts alleged, but claimed that the Baltimore firm furnished no facilities sufficient to handle ti and that the carriers refused cars.

The higher court holds that "a buyer ofof to be shipped in the future may refuse to recognize the seller's cancellation of the unperformed contract of sale, may wait until the agreed shipping period has expired and may then purchase on the open market the number of bushels which the seller agreed to, but did not ship, and the measure of damages in such case is the difference between the contract price and the market price paid at the stipulated time and place

The lower court instructed the jury that the measure of recovery is the difference between the contract price and the market price within a reasonable time after defendant had notified plaintiff that it could not comply with the contracts and measured on this rule the jury allowed plain-tiffs only a part of the claim, which the high court holds is sufficient error to remand the case back for trial.




