

## START SLASHES IN RAIL SERVICE BY END OF WEEK

Order to Eliminate Several Omaha Trains Expected Soon; No Inconvenience to Traveling Public.

Curtailment of passenger train service in Omaha is expected to go into effect the last of this week or the first of next by Omaha railroad officials.

Reports reaching Omaha indicate that the war measure curtailment plan ordered last week already has been worked out and that announcement will reach Omaha in a few days.

Omaha officials, however, are ignorant of the changes that will be made, but continue to believe the traveling public will in no way be inconvenienced.

It is said several Omaha trains can be eliminated without discommodating the traveling public.

The elimination order applying to Omaha trains will come from President Aishton of the Northwestern. He will receive his orders from Gerritt Fort, director general.

It is said Omaha passenger officials have developed a plan to curtail the number of trains with an eye toward conservation of motive power and equipment and that this plan now is in the hands of the director general.

Coincident with the service curtailment Omaha railroad men again are giving considerable thought to consolidation of ticket offices, a war measure they believe is sure to come, not only in Omaha, but in every city in the country.

One railroad pays almost \$1,000 a month rent for its Omaha ticket office. Three others are paying from \$500 to \$600. The remainder pay from \$150 to \$200. It is said one office with a rental of not more than \$300 or \$600 would suffice.

## YEGGMEN CRACK SAFE AND STEAL LIBERTY BONDS

Yeggmen blew a safe in the grocery store of H. Reuben, 2422-24 Sherman avenue, during the night and escaped with loot consisting of Liberty bonds, a 17-jewel watch, six \$2.50 gold pieces and a quantity of old coins. Papers and books were found scattered about the floor.

Officer Downing early Monday morning found the iron door of the store unlocked and upon investigation discovered the door of the safe open.

No one in the immediate neighborhood heard the reports of the nitroglycerine explosions, presumably owing to the density of the murky atmosphere and the care which the yeggmen exercised in packing the bored holes in the safe door with butchers' aprons and gunny sacks.

A sack containing money used for change for the day's receipts, which was hidden on a shelf behind canned goods, was not touched.

## STATE STILL KEEPS EMBARGO ON CORN

No Seed Will Be Shipped Out Until Every Nebraska County Has Been Supplied.

The embargo on Nebraska corn will not be raised until every county in the state has been supplied with sufficient seed. County farm agents are locating the counties with a surplus and the counties where a shortage exists and when the proper adjustments have been made the embargo will be lifted.

Every mail is bringing inquiries to the State Council for Defense from other states desiring to purchase seed corn. The calls are insistent and indicate a great shortage in neighboring states. Officials of the State Council for Defense say that the demands from other states will make it necessary within a short time to lift the present embargo against shipping corn out of the state. When that time comes it will no longer be possible for Nebraska farmers to purchase seed corn of their neighbors. The council expects that the state will be overrun by seed men endeavoring to purchase all available supplies.

"Nebraska first" will be the motto of the Council for Defense, but its officials point out that the embargo cannot be kept up indefinitely and that those who need seed must order it at once.

## From Other States.

Iowa has long been in hard straits and its farmers are eagerly seizing on all corn that they can obtain. The shortage of seed corn in Missouri is probably the greatest in the history of the state, certainly the greatest within recent years, according to information reaching the Council for Defense. Germination tests made by farmers, county agents and the government seed testing laboratory at Columbia indicate that half of the Missouri seed corn is worthless. Tests that have been made show that at

least half of Missouri corn will not germinate above 50 per cent. Some farmers have found only a few ears in their whole lot of seed which have germinated strong.

For the first time in many years Wisconsin is dependent upon other states for seed corn. To do more than maintain last year's acreage of corn, which was nearly 2,000,000 acres, it is necessary to plant 300,000 bushels of seed. Only about 200,000 bushels have been supplied thus far. The members of the Wisconsin experiment station have sold every available bushel of seed corn to other farmers. The state is still 100,000 bushels short.

## Another Belt Line Crash Is Averted by Motorman

Twenty-five passengers on a south-bound Twenty-fourth street car were thrown into a panic at 9:30 Monday morning when a collision with a Missouri Pacific train at Twenty-fourth street and the Belt Line was narrowly averted.

The car had just started to cross the railroad tracks following the conductor's signal to proceed when the train suddenly appeared. The motorman was barely able to prevent the collision by instant application of the brakes. Passengers in the car were shaken up by the forced stop, but no one was injured.

It was in this location last January that a collision between a runaway cinder car and a street car resulted in the death of three persons and injuries to several others.

## Committee Will Determine Fair Price for Sugar Beets

Five men have been appointed by State Food Administrator Wattles as a committee to determine what is a fair price that should be paid to growers of sugar beets for their product in order to increase production. The committee is made up of Dean E. A. Burnett, Lincoln; Prof. H. C. Filley, Lincoln; A. E. Cady, St. Paul; W. I. Farley, Aurora; Andrew Weiss, Mitchell.

The committee will meet at the call of Chairman Burnett and take up the work as soon as the appointments are confirmed by the federal food administration at Washington.
