The work is done in the name of the Legion of Loyal Women, who have made the supplying of feather pillows for military base hospitals at home and abroad part of their work. The Ameraproad part of their work. The American Red Cross hospital at Neuilly, France has been provided by them with hundreds of these pillows.

Mrs. Mary Logan Tucker, daughter of the late General John A. Logan, and president of the Legion of Loyal Women, stated that last year the women made up about 2,000 pounds of feathers which had been donated for the purpose by women all over for the purpose by women all over the country. After the feathers were renovated they were made into hundreds of pillows, not only for beds, but for train pillows and little comfort pillows to be used for resting broken arms and wounded limbs.




