Ice Falls Into Line

If you use ice during the coming summer you will pay more for it than ever before. Effective April 1 the price will be advanced and consumers will have to pay 50 cents a 100 pounds, or 10 per cent more than last year. Blame it onto the

Last year when the consumer of ice bought a book of coupons, by paying cash, there was a reduction of 10 per cent from the 50 cents per 100-pound price. This year the discount is to be eliminated and the price will be 50 cents a 100 pounds. Dealers in both manufactured and natural ice assert that the ad-

vance in price is a matter of necessity, if they are to continue in business. They say that they have increased the wages of their men and that feed for the horses used in delivering has advanced 50 to 100 per cent. They point to the fact that fast summer they were buying hay at \$6 to \$8 a ton and that the same quality of hay now costs them \$20 to \$22. They say that last year they bought oats at 40 to 60 cents a bushel and that now the same quality of oats cost 90 cents to \$1 a bushel. All other expenses they say have increased proportionately.


